St. Aloysius Gonzaga, Pray for us!



St. Aloysius Gonzaga was a Jesuit Deacon who lived in Italy and Rome. June 21st is his feast day. He was well-known for his purity. He had taken a vow of perpetual virginity while very young, safeguarding himself from the temptations of this world.

In 1591, when a plague broke out in Rome, he volunteered to serve in the hospital. It was not long before he came down with the plague himself. He died on at the age of 23 and he is the patron saint of youth and plague victims.

In this Covid-19 pandemic, we can rely on St. Aloysius' intercession for healing and also for the grace to be a witness for the love of God and neighbor. It is very significant during these difficult times and global pandemic to reflect on St. Aloysius' quote: "I am but a crooked piece of iron, and have come into religion to be made straight by the hammer of



mortification and penance." In this earthly life, we need to focus on God and straighten our lives by mortification and penance. We have to make use of every opportunity which God provides in our lives to do good and comfort the needy.

When we sacrifice our wants it becomes the need for someone else so that we can freely offer to them. Our little sacrifices have great merits in the eyes of God. Penance is the pinnacle in our spiritual life. When we ask any favor of God with penance it would be granted because God is so pleased by our total trust in Him.

As the Coronavirus convulses us, it is giving us an opportunity to reflect on the vulnerability of our very being and our need to turn towards the Lord to build up solidarity among all of us.

We can permit the Holy Spirit to take control of our life. Similar to St. Aloysius who loved the promptings of the Holy Spirit and lived his life accordingly. St. Aloysius was a very devout soul too the Blessed Mother, Mary who is the Mediatrix of all graces. He was very fond of offering mortifications and praying the Rosary in honor of our Heavenly Mother, Mary.

Our little sacrifices have great merits in the eyes of God. During this COVID-19 pandemic, we are isolated, but we are not alone; the pandemic cannot and must not stop the work of the Church!

Let us ask God for the end of Covid-19 through the intercession of St. Aloysius. Let us partake in the Church's penitential life and serve God and our neighbors.
