CARING IN THE COLUMBUS DIOCESE: BISHOP GRIFFIN RESOURCE CENTER

The Bishop Griffin Resource Center in Columbus has been operating a drive-thru food pantry every Wednesday and Friday since March 2020. Even though the pantry serves nearly twice as many families as before the pandemic, with a current average of 800 families per month, they have been able to more than double the amount of food provided to each family. Families with children under the age of three are given diapers and wipes. An outside "pop-up" store has allowed families to continue to receive at no cost winter coats, hats, gloves, hand sanitizer, masks, and pet food. Volunteers are the backbone of the center, with their hard work serving a neighborhood hit hard by unemployment and under-employment associated with the pandemic.



FIRST STEP: KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC SOCIAL SERVICES AND COMMUNITY SERVICE AGENCIES

Know services and agencies that can be referral partners for the parish and its parishioners when aiding vulnerable community members. For instance, encourage parishioners who need support maintaining their independance to contact Catholic Social Services (https://www.colscss.org) and who struggle to pay utilities to participate in the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Programs (https://tinyurl.com/yy236oue). Advocate for social services – including food pantries, public transportation, affordable housing, medical services, and mental health services – that assist vulnerable populations.



Many young people already have an interest in caring for the environment and one another. To help them understand the connections between the two and the role of their faith, introduce them to Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Si'. The Catholic Agency for Overseas Development has a youth ministry session for middle and high school teens (https://tinyurl.com/y3k5odót) intended to engage their everyday experiences and reflect on how we can, but sometimes do not, respect our common home and one another. There are suggestions for how to better care through everyday choices as well as a prayer and animation.

TAKE A STEP TOGETHER: KNOW YOUR COMMUNITY'S VULNERABILITY

Know which parts of your community are vulnerable to flooding, storm damage, and pollution or has residents unable to cope with extreme summer and winter temperatures. Use this knowledge to inform parish missions and evangelism.

Develop a list to check on and aid vulnerable parishioners before, during, and after extreme weather events. Include alerts before events to anticipate parishioner needs and consider use of parish facilities when appropriate.
